#### Basic Division of Houses

- Detached/single unit housing
- Semi-detached houses (duplexe)
- Attached/multi unit housing

## Type of single unit housing

- Cottage, a small house, with a typical floor plan of four main rooms.
- Bungalow, describes a medium to large sized freestanding house on a generous block in the suburbs. Some rooms in a bungalow typically have doors which link them together.
- Villa, a large house which one might retreat to in the country. a freestanding comfortable sized house, on a large block, generally found in the suburbs.
- Mansion, a very large house, usually of more than one story, on a very large block of land or estate.



## Semi Detached Housing

- consists of pairs of houses built side by side as units sharing a party wall and usually in such a way that each house's layout is a mirror image of its twin.
- semi-detached houses have front, rear and any one side open spaces







### Attached/Multi Unit Housing

- continuous row houses with open spaces at the front and back
- is a style of housing in use since the late 17th century, where a row of identical or mirror-image houses share side walls. The first and last of these houses is called an *end terrace*, usually larger than those houses in the middle.
- various forms of attached housing where a number of dwelling units are co-located within the same structure, which share a ground-level entry and may or may not have any private open space, such as <u>apartments</u>
